Polenta

Once upon a time, we MARA members decided to share recipes in our newsletter. That idea came and went. Whatever my reason was for writing this article, it is not important, because here is the article.

When I was a child, a half a century ago, my maternal grandparents were both still alive. They grew up in a mountain valley, one on the German side of the valley, and one on the Austrian side. Of course, there is no Austrian language, so they both spoke German. That same valley is now part of northern Italy. They both immigrated to Milwaukee, where they met. They ended up raising a family on a farm just north of Fremont, Michigan.

We would have family get-togethers on holidays and other weekends at the farm. The children outnumbered the adults three to one. My grandfather made his own sausage, wine, cheese, and other things too numerous to mention. The food was all very excellent, but the centerpiece of the table was the polenta. Most of us only ate polenta at the farm, and it was a real treat. There may have been 30 people there, and the polenta was a cake about 16 inches in diameter, and maybe 4 inches tall. We would put a slice on our plate, and pour gravy over it. Yum.

Over the last 50 years, I haven't seen or heard anything about polenta, other than at the occasional family get-togethers. A few weeks ago, I was surprised to see a high-end restaurant chain advertising

polenta dishes on television. So I did a little research, and found out that polenta has been around since ancient times. It has been a staple food all over the world in different forms, and under different names. "Polenta" is an Italian word. Ironically, even though polenta has always been classified as a "peasant food", it has gained popularity over the last 10 years in many fancy restaurants. Some versions of polenta take hours to cook. They have even come up with an "instant polenta", and also a microwave version, for those who don't have time to make real polenta. Our family's polenta is so quick and easy; it makes those imposters seem like a waste of time. But when you start cooking it, it needs your undivided attention for a few minutes. A big batch is easier to make, because you don't have to hold the pan while you stir it. Either way, you want to start with a fairly full box of yellow corn meal.

Here's what you do; get a pan with a couple inches of water in it. Add a little salt (optional), and bring the water to a boil. While stirring the water, sprinkle the meal into the water. You can add the meal fairly quickly at the start, but as it thickens, you need to slow down. If you add the meal too quickly, you will get lumps, not a good thing. Keep stirring, and keep sprinkling. It will get thicker and thicker. As it thickens, turn the heat down; you don't want it to stick to the pan.

You want to get it as thick as you possibly can, you will know when to stop.

When you can barely stir it anymore, you are done. You can keep a tiny bit of heat under it for a while to finish turning it into a cake. Break it loose from the pan, and flop it out onto a platter. Slice it up, and serve it with gravy or some type of meat sauce. I've even heard of people putting maple syrup on it, but you're on your own there.

Some recipes call for a finely ground corn meal or flour, some use white corn, some even use chestnut flour. But we always used regular old yellow corn meal.

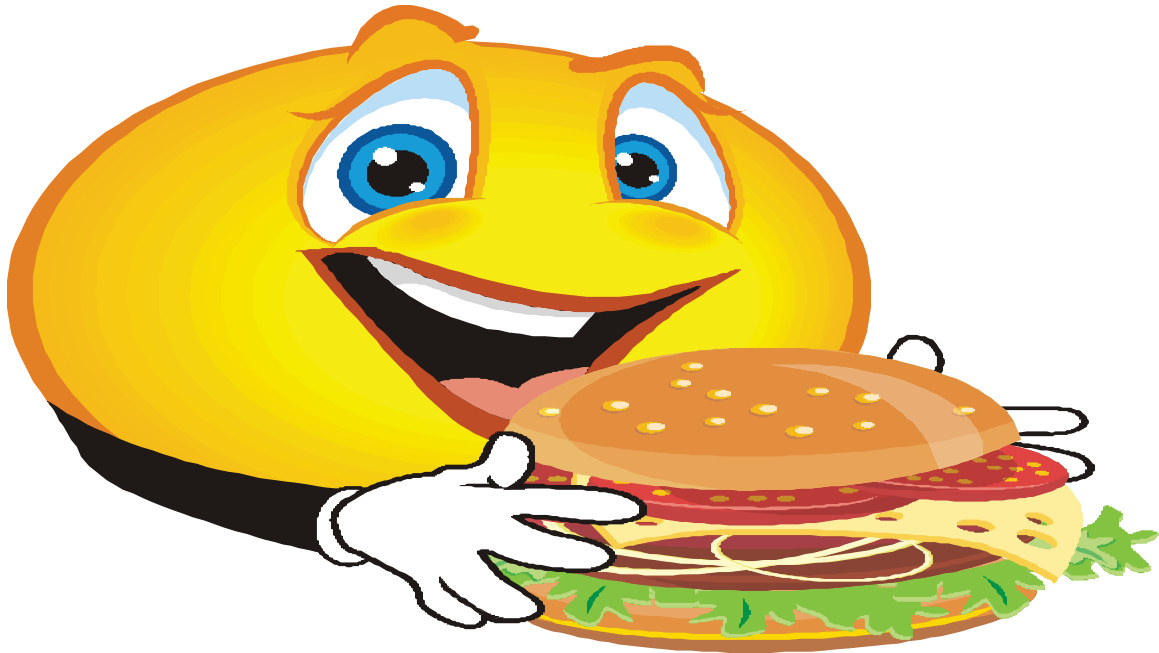
